Welcome to Chordiality: Sea Pictures

Chordiality is a community based choir of about 70 members which started in February 2008. We are based in Indooroopilly and our membership is Brisbane-wide. We love to sing and enjoy each other's company. Chordiality's goals are to pursue choral excellence and have fun singing together

Today's concert features music about the seas and the rivers that feed them. The sea has deeply affected human culture and can appear in contradictory ways: as both powerful but serene, and as beautiful but dangerous. Music too has been inspired by the sea and our program can bring but a small selection.

We open our concert with *For Those in Peril on the Sea*, known as "the Sailors' hymn" and adopted as the anthem of the Australian, British and American navies. Sea shanties were chanted or sung by mariners to help coordinate arduous tasks in the era of wind-driven ships. Water is often seen as a symbol of tranquillity, as illustrated by pieces such as *Reflets dans l'eau* in our program. Traditional folk music is also represented. We hope you enjoy today's musical homage to the sea!



Music Director - Ross Jelf

Ross began conducting at 17 years of age and formally trained at UQ, receiving a Bachelor of Music and Education and a Graduate Certificate in Music Studies with Distinction. Before moving to the UK in 2009, Ross conducted the Buderim Male Choir, the Sunshine Coast Choral Society, the Sacred Music Ensemble and Strings n Things Chamber Orchestra. In London, Ross attended the Royal Academy of Music

where he studied with many prominent choral directors and conducted professional choirs such as the BBC Singers. He graduated with a Master of Arts in Choral Conducting. Outside the Academy, Ross remained involved in community music and sang professionally with the Choral Scholars of St Martin-in-the-Fields and Southwark Cathedral. Ross now resides in Brisbane where he is the Musical Director of Pro Musica Singers, Chordiality, the University of the Sunshine Coast Singers and Cantate Singers, as well being a Lay Clerk at St John's Cathedral.

SELECTED PROGRAM NOTES AND LYRICS

To be Sung on the Water - Samuel Barber

Words by Louise Bogan

Samuel Barber's (1910 - 1981) music, masterfully crafted, is at once lyrical, rhythmically complex and harmonically rich. *To be Sung on the Water* sets a text by the American Poet Laureate, Louise Bogan. It is thought Barber intended to insert this song into his opera *Antony and Cleopatra* but decided against it. However his affection for the piece was such he asked that it be performed at his funeral.

Louise Bogan (1897 – 1970) was poetry editor of The New Yorker magazine for nearly 40 years. She has been called by some the most accomplished woman poet of the twentieth century

Beautiful, my delight, Pass, as we pass the wave; Pass as the mottled night Leaves what it cannot save, Scattering dark and bright.

Beautiful, pass and be less than the guiltless shade To which our vows were said – Less than the sound of the oar To which our vows were made, Less than the sound of its blade Dipping the stream once more.

Crossing the Bar – Graeme Morton

Words by Alfred, Lord Tennyson

Graeme Morton is one of Australia's most eclectic choral musicians, with a wealth of experience as a conductor, teacher, composer and broadcaster of choral music.

Alfred, Lord Tennyson (1809 – 1892) was Poet Laureate of Great Britain and Ireland during much of Queen Victoria's reign. *Crossing the Bar* written in 1889, three years before he died, beautifully captures the peaceful acceptance of life's final journey into the hereafter.

Sunset and evening star, And one clear call for me! And may there be no moaning of the bar When I put out to sea; But such a tide as moving seems asleep, Too full for sound and foam, When that which drew from out the boundless deep Turns again home.

Twilight and evening bell, And after that the dark!

And may there be no sadness of farewell When I embark;

For, though from out our bourne of time and place The flood may bear me far.

I hope to see my Pilot face to face When I have crossed the bar

And Miriam Sang (Shiru l'Adonai) - Zebulon Highben

Zebulon M. Highben is an award-winning composer, conductor, and educator. He is Assistant Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at Muskingum University, in southeastern Ohio.

Black Swana – Stephen Leek

Stephen Leek is an extensively commissioned freelance composer, freelance conductor, educator and publisher. His distinctive music is immediately recognizable, capturing the enigmas, drama, rhythms, colours and ethos of Australia. In *Black Swana* Leek has written a joyful arrangement of a Torres Strait Islander song written by Henry "Seaman" Dan.

The Sea of Berries - Paul Jarman

Paul Jarman is a widely acclaimed Australian composer, performer, musical director and educator. He is most well known as a lyricist and composer of choral music. *The Sea of Berries* was commissioned in 2001 by the Gondwana Voices and describes the treacherous Sargasso Sea.

Eagle flying over indigo. Shadow dancing on the ruby sea. Lonely ship, drifting aimlessly. Waiting for the west wind to blow Lonely ship, sailing farther stray. Far from our homeland.

Ghostly figures drift across the bow Creatures lurk beneath the caravel Lonely ship drifing in the ocean desert. Waiting for a breath in the sails. Lonely ship, gone another day Far from our homeland.

Lost forever weaving endlessly on the Sargasso Sea. Drifting silently to water graves on the Sargasso Sea.

Water crystals in the evening glow Sea of berries swim in purple light Night has fallen on the Sargasso Still no trade wind blowing through the sail, floating in the dark. Stars could guide us home. Fading day by day, drifting farther stray! (chorus)

The Seal Lullaby - Eric Whitacre

Words by Rudyard Kipling

Eric Whitacre is a Grammy-winning American composer, conductor, and speaker, known for his choral, orchestral and wind ensemble music.

Joseph Rudyard Kipling (1865 –1936) was one of the most popular writers in the United Kingdom, in both prose and verse, in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. *The Seal Lullaby*, from "The White Seal" in *The Jungle Book*, is a beautifully crafted poem; a story that acknowledges the dangers in the world but promises safety anyway

Oh! hush thee, my baby, the night is behind us, And black are the waters that sparkled so green. The moon, o'er the combers, looks downward to find us At rest in the hollows that rustle between.

Where billow meets billow, then soft be thy pillow; Ah, weary wee flipperling, curl at thy ease! The storm shall not wake thee, nor shark overtake thee, Asleep in the arms of the slow-swinging seas.
